They are moving forward on the Retention & Graduation Plan, with efforts tailored to students' needs. Katie Moffat, Retention Director, presented information about how the Early Alerts work (attached to these minutes). After several questions were raised, Dr. Eskandari noted that more information definitely needs to be shared with the faculty.

The Provost also stated that the Fall mini-break idea has been approved by OCHE. We will have a Fall break starting in the 2023-2024 academic year, to coincide with the state-wide teacher conference. The Senate applauded this new break.

The workshop course is student-run, and they have good momentum to keep that going. The rest of the changes are to update the CHMY 141 & 143 credit changes in the various programs. It was noted that the Broadfield programs have the same outcomes for the teaching and non-teaching majors, so those should be revised.

VII. PROVOST REPORT continued

With time left, the Senate returned to the Provost's Report.

Provost Eskandari stated the Sprint Degrees being put forward are the Paramedic AAS and the Human Services BS. The Paramedic program has been working on an accelerated plan of study for some time, so they were a great choice for this pilot. This is an OCHE initiative with an accelerated timescale. For an AAS program, it should be completed in 3 semesters and for a BS, 7 semesters, including Summers. The Board of Regents and the Governor are very excited about these programs. In fact, the Governor's proposed budget includes \$2 million over 2 years for Sprint Degrees. That funding will go to student support, because a student in these programs will not be able to work. Also, financial aid is hard to come by in Summer, so that support will be needed, as well as tutoring and advising.

The Provost also reported on the NASH Project on Curricular Flexibility. The proposal is that MUS campuses will share online courses. This is already happening, but it is a great deal of work for Registrars to make sure those courses transfer correctly. The hope is, by the end of this academic year, 6 campuses will be running this project. We will need to make decisions about how many seats we reserve for MSUB students and how many for other students—and all those decisions will be made with faculty participation.


He also noted that faculty who wish to nominate colleagues for emeritus status **and have it conferred at Commencement**, those nominations must be sent to the BOR in January.

Dr. Eskandari also noted that several programs have requested massive increases for their course and program fees. While he is aware that the prices of all kinds of materials have gone up, he is opposed to transferring all that cost to our students. The increases, therefore, were limited to 3-5%.
