A minimum of 36 credits must be upper division classes (300 and above).

Extended Major - In lieu of obtaining a minor in another discipline, history majors may choose the "extended major" option in history. To fulfill the extended major option students are required to complete an additional twelve upper-division (300-400 level) credits in history courses. These courses can be in any combination chosen from among the restricted electives offered by the history program. These credits are in addition to the other general education, language requirements, history major requirements, and minimum credits required for a degree. Students who seek this option do not have to obtain a minor in another discipline
