Movin' On in Montana Summer Camp



Transitioning from high school to either college or the workforce is an anxiety inducing time for the life of any student, especially one with disabilities. Movin' On in Montana helps alleviate this anxiety by providing mentoring experiences between high school students with disabilities and current MSUB students who also have a disability.

Movin' On in Montana Summer Camp is for high school students with disabilities wanting to explore post-secondary opportunities. Held on the campus of Montana State University Billings this four-day event provides students with experiences of living in residential housing, eating in the cafeteria, attending classes, touring three college campuses, and attending a Billings Mustangs baseball game, touring the Yellowstone art Museum, and meeting other students from across the state. The summer camp is FREE for any student who would like to attend.

Eligibility Requirements:

For individual students to be eligible to participate in the summer camp, a student must:

- Be between the ages of 14 and 21
- Be a student in a high school or other recognized education program, grades 9 through 12
- Have a disability (receiving services or accommodations under and IEP or 504
 Plan or has a disability but is currently not being served under an IEP or 504
